ABOUT:

Strong Beginnings is a community-wide effort to improve maternal, paternal and child health among African Americans and Latinxs, promote father engagement, and advance racial equity in birth outcomes. Strong Beginnings utilized MIBFN's Community Conversation model to lead a conversation to center the perspective of Black families and professionals in Kent County, Michigan throughout their birthing and breastfeeding experience. The Community Conversation virtually took place on May 6, 2023 and was facilitated/transcribed by Black community participants.

Expert families were provided a gratitude stipend and catered meal to nourish their families.

"Breastfeeding education
was more-so glossed over
for me. They did not go
into detail. It was not
encouraged [as] very
important."

INADEQUATE PRENATAL LACTATION EDUCATION AND COUNSELING

is being provided to Black birthing families.

HISTORICAL TRAUMA, ONGOING MEDICAL RACISM, AND BIRTH TRAUMA

are pervasive issues facing Black birthing families in Kent county. "Folks said Black people don't breastfeed and asked me why I was breastfeeding."

BARRIERS

"I struggled with going back to work and not having any place to breastfeed. I struggled with my chest hurting for hours."

SYSTEMS DO NOT SUPPORT FAMILIES,

like workplaces, child cares, child protective services, and many others

SOCIETAL NORMS CREATE SHAME AND GUILT FOR LACTATING FAMILIES

around natural choices, like breastfeeding in public and extended breastfeeding. "[Breastfeeding] was fine until my baby turned one. [After that], they told me that it was not normal. People were sexualizing breastfeeding because of her age."





COMMUNITY CONVERSATION

"If we have more cultural and ethnic representation, it would hopefully make things easier. We shouldn't have to worry about advocating and getting services."

LACK OF TRUSTED
PROVIDERS THAT REFLECT
AND REPRESENT THOSE
THEY SERVE

makes it difficult for Black families to get the support they need. In the health care and public health systems,

FATHERS ARE EXCLUDED FROM THE ENTIRE BIRTH AND BREASTFEEDING PROCESS

through lack of support and resources centered on their experiences. "I was asking questions, but was not given many answers. Procedures were being done [on] our child without consent. I tried to advocate and was not heard."

"I've never encountered Black person assisting me in any way, shape, or form in [the] WIC office that is hands-on with clients."

BARRIERS

"The lactation consultant was really short and did not help me. I became discouraged with that...No one encouraged me to keep breastfeeding."

PROVIDERS DO NOT HONOR FAMILIES THEY SERVE

by not listening, trusting, or centering Black families in their own lived birth and breastfeeding experiences.

CHILD PROTECTIVE SERVICES INTERFERES WITH HUMAN MILK FEEDING

by investigating, intimidating, and forcibly separating Black families. "CPS was called on me before I was breastfeeding and pregnant at the time. My milk decreased a lot due to how stressed I was."

PROVIDERS MUST LISTEN TO, TRUST, AND CENTER BLACK FOLKS, INCLUDING FATHERS SUPPORT PEOPLE, AND THEIR LIVED EXPERIENCES "Getting support with human milk feeding started with Strong Beginnings. Before that, I had [some] support, but not support for breastfeeding, because no one I [was] around actually had a human milk feeding experience."

WRAP-UP EVENT

CHANGE MUST HAPPEN.

Tangible next steps and accountability are necessary to ensure that Black families in Kent county are listened to, respected, and centered. A Wrap-Up Event was virtually held on December 6, 2023 to share a preliminary report with participants to ensure that the report accurately reflected the meeting and discuss actionable, measurable next steps based on the main themes. Compensation and a meal gift card was provided to those who participated.

"Without the personal connection to Bonita, I probably would have said no to this invitation. I have already shared my experience in so many different forums and not much has changed. It adds salt to the wound to have to keep sharing painful and exhausting experiences and, to what end? There has to be a measure of accountability otherwise it is a waste of my time."
